

Southbourne Junior School Sports Premium Funding Statement 2016-17

What is the Sports Premium?

The government has provided Sports Premium funding for the academic year 2016-17 to provide additional and sustainable improvements to PE and sport for the benefit of all pupils and to encourage the development of healthy and active lifestyles. Allocations for the academic year 2016 to 2017 are calculated using the number of pupils in years 3 to 6 as recorded in the January 2017 census. It will see money going directly to primary schools to spend on improving the quality of sport and P.E; each school will receive £8,000 plus an extra £5 per pupil - here at Southbourne Juniors that will mean we receive approximately £9,180.

Last year 2016-17 Southbourne Junior School spent the grant on the following:

- **Staff CPD & enhanced provision of gymnastics in the PE Curriculum. £950** was spent on providing staff with training, resources and confidence to use apparatus and teach gymnastics. This provided excellent gymnastic lessons for children, whilst also developing teacher's pedagogy in teaching PE and gym.
- **Raising children's interest in physical activity through OAA activity days and CPD for staff in OAA - £1200** was spent in providing a day for each year group to take part in different OAA activities run by Chichester University. Schemes of work for staff was created to upskill and support staff in delivering the OAA curriculum.
- **Providing competitive opportunities by creating links with WSSSP - £1600** was allocated to enable children in KS2 to participate in a range of competitive events. The money paid for entry costs and transport for a range of competitions including locality and county cross country races, Chichester Corporate Challenge, GAS football, Tag Rugby, Chichester Locality football and cricket tournaments.
- **Sports Coaching - £1120** enabled all children in years 5 and 6 to have ½ term squash coaching. A school team continued to participate in a squash tournament at Chichester Squash Club against other local primary schools. We were able to fund a hockey after school club for children.
- **Beach explorers - £1620** enabled all children in years one to six to undertake a six week Forest Schools experience as part of their OAA. This has proved to be an excellent opportunity for all children to learn new skills in our local environment.
- **Outdoor Markings- 1500-** To improve physical activity we have begun to lay down new marking for the outdoor area that are age appropriate and promote activity and healthy living.
- **Swimming- £1000-** Many children still required top up swimming as they were unable to swim a minimum of 25 metres. To increase participation of swimming we aimed to provide these children with the chance to take part in further swimming lessons in the final summer term
- **Sports equipment (Hockey)- £160-** enable children to use update equipment during PE lessons and after school Hockey clubs.

Total spend: £9180

IMPACT

- Staff confidence and ability to deliver quality PE, especially gymnastics and OAA lessons, has grown and is continuing to develop. % of staff feel that they now know more about how to teach gymnastic skills and positions used in gymnastics.
- Quality of PE improved – good use of OAA, hockey and squash coaches to help deliver these parts of the curriculum. In particular: Beach Explorers and OOA days have enabled the children to learn the importance of team and learnt important team building skills. % of children feel they have learnt new skills in PE this year through the use of the OAA days, coaching and Beach schools as well as through staff OAA CPD. % of children also believe that PE in school is taught well and enjoy PE.
- Opportunity for all KS2 children to participate in competitions and learn how it feels to compete – to win or not. % of the school have competed competitively for the school in inter-school competition
- Significant increase in number of children participating in hockey in an after school club and as a result pupils have been given an opportunity to compete against other school and some have even begun to join Havant Hockey Club. % of pupils now participate in clubs outside of school. We will look to see a rise in this over the next academic year.

This year **2017-18** Southbourne Junior School intends to continue using the grant in much the same way ie staff CPD, paying for children to attend competitions and sporting activities, events that less engaged children can be involved with including the Beach Schools and providing any resources as needed.
